

Personal Reflections on Our Journey

Rewind to 1994, the year I first met Joanne Corless and her 4-year old son, AJ. This is when the journey that would lead to The AJ Foundation and The Comprehensive Learning Center began. I was 24 years old, a year out of graduate school, and new to the professional world of autism intervention. My passion for the science of Applied Behavior Analysis and excitement for my new profession were without measure! I was very fortunate to be working at a world-renowned program for people with autism, a program Joanne was pursuing for her son but was unable to attain due to a very long wait list.





So there we were, a parent who needed a program for her son and me, a new professional eager to build my career at a place that prioritized child and family outcomes, while also strictly adhering to science-based interventions. At that time, the only option that satisfied each of us was to create such a program. And so the journey began...

Fast-forward 23 years... The AJ Foundation has been successfully raising funds to benefit people with autism for over two decades! That missing school program, The Comprehensive Learning Center, was created where AJ would get the treatment and education he needed. Today, many others with autism and their families are getting the services they need to be successful at school, at home and in their communities.

Professionally, I was able to realize my vision of a career in a place where meaningful outcomes for people with autism takes precedence above all else! I now spend my days with a new generation of young professionals who hold the same passion and excitement for our science and the work we do as I did (and still do!) at their age.

As our journey continues, we have very exciting things on the horizon. Thanks to the dedication and hard work of many over this past year, CLC is expanding once again! We are relocating to a new building almost double our current size! We are so excited to continue growing our program to meet the lifelong needs of our current students and graduates, and to continue welcoming new students and young professionals.

As I reflect on how we started and where we are today, it must be said that everything accomplished thus far was only possible because of the overwhelming support of so many! Help for our individuals with autism comes in many forms. Of course, we couldn't have done any of it without financial support. A less-recognized but vitally important form of support comes from local businesses and professionals. These people create opportunities for and welcome our very hard-working students and graduates into their own professional lives. In this newsletter, we spotlight these amazing people and the businesses that work with us to create opportunities for people with autism that expand outside the walls of our program.

Our school has been expanding since we opened in 2000. Not only have we grown to include more students, families, professional staff, programs and larger facilities, but we have also expanded through important partnerships in our local community. As part of both our **Transition Services** and our Adult Program, we have created strong alliances with many outside organizations and businesses where our young adults with autism gain real world, hands-on experience in the workplace.

On these pages, we highlight seventeen community organizations that provide volunteer, membership and/or employment opportunities for those in our Adult Program, as well as our current students working towards the transition to adulthood.

ADELPHI RESEARCH (Doylestown)

AJ has worked at Adelphi as a paid employee for six years. He has grown along with the





AJ successfully navigates public transportation to get to and from work, and has his own cubicle and computer to call "home" once he arrives. Among his many ongoing office duties, such as setting up email and phone extensions for new hires, ordering office supplies, and distributing mail, AJ has also been called upon to assist a colleague learning similar responsibilities.





CLC's New Home -Coming Summer of 2018!

The year 2018 will see the entire CLC/AJF community turning the page on a new chapter in our program's growth and success over the past 20 years. With a student body and instructional staff that is beyond the capacity of our building at 150 James Way in Southampton, we began searching for a location early this year that could accommodate our needs both now and in the future.

This search lead us to 444 Jacksonville Road in Warminster. approximately 4 miles from our current location. The two-story 21,000 square foot building was originally built in 1973 but was completely renovated in 2003 to modern construction standards. Working with the amazing team of **Cerminara Architect** (Architect), Iron Hill Construction Management, Inc. (Builder), and J.G. Pertrucci Co., Inc. (Owner/Developer) to transform the space into our ideal school, CLC has found its new home!

In our new location, we will be enjoying:

- · Larger classrooms to accommodate new students and the growth of our adult program
- Additional office space for staff (no more shared desks)
- More conference room and meeting space
- Two separate gyms to accommodate simultaneous classes
- Two kitchens conducive to teaching various home living skills
- Extra private showers and two laundry areas to teach self-help and independence
- A dedicated nurse's office
- Expanded storage areas
- An elevator connecting the first and second floors

You'll be receiving an invitation to our Open House after our move in June, 2018. Assuming we don't experience any unforeseen delays, we'll be prepared to open our doors to our students on July 5th, 2018!

On hand were over \$30,000 of donated items including Philadelphia pro-sports team tickets, Lady Gaga concert tickets, a stay at the Great Wolf Lodge, a Go-Pro Camera, an Apple iWatch and a deluxe getaway package for the Borgata Hotel, Casino & Spa.

Team ISI Benefits (captain - Michael Jacobson) came in first place in the AJF's Team Challenge 2017 for raising \$11,000; Team Blackthorn Rugby (captain – Allan Corless) followed in second place by raising \$10,200; and Team Anna (captain—Tiffany Dimedio) took 3rd place honors by contributing \$8,700 toward AJF's fundraising goal.

AJF Golf 4 Autism: November 6, 2017

The 21st Annual AJ Foundation Golf 4 Autism was held on Monday, November 6th at the Philmont Country Club after Mother Nature postponed play, not once, but twice!
