Adult Life Skills Program - Art in The Pod

In September of 2022, Will M. became the fourth adult learner from CLC to join the, 'Follow Your Art' class at *Art in the Pod*, a small studio in Churchville, PA. For an hour and a half each Friday afternoon, Will joins other adults from the autism and special needs community, including three of his friends from CLC's Adult Life Skills Program, to draw, paint, and sculpt with clay. Within this welcoming environment, Will and his fellow artists are free to explore their creativity, socialize with friends, and learn new skills. With the gentle guidance of the art instructor, Nina, the learners are able to design their own masterpieces while learning about various artists and techniques. There is no judgement here, and the only prerequisite is an interest in spending time with friends and having fun with art.

For Lucas, Dan, Derek, and Will, their time at *Art in the Pod* is a much-anticipated highlight to their week. Each of these learners holds multiple volunteer positions within the community, enjoys a variety of social opportunities, and fully participates in home and family life. They are ever increasing their independence, giving back to their communities, and living happy and fulfilled lives. And like other adults, their success is often measured by the hustle and bustle of their involvement in these activities. In fact, 'work' is often the definitive characteristic of adulthood. Work provides a sense of purpose, fulfillment, and belonging. But it's also important to find this sense of purpose, fulfillment and belonging in other ways and in other places.

At Art in the Pod, participants are given artistic and personal freedom within a structured, guided lesson. Our learners are able to practice the skills they've previously mastered at CLC, and are able to continue to build upon those skills leading up to and during these lessons. The learners attend these classes with their Life Skills Coaches who help to facilitate the learners' involvement in the class; but in this class, Nina is the teacher and the learners follow her direction. Each time a learner completes a piece of art, there is an obvious sense of accomplishment and pride—felt by the learners, of course, but also by their parents and the ALSP staff. The pride we feel has less to do with the final product and more to do with the hard work these learners have done to accomplish their goals of community involvement, socialization, and independence. The years of quality programming our learners have received, and continue to receive, from CLC has brought them to this class and at *Art in the Pod*, everyone succeeds!








Staying Up to Date

Comprehensive Learning Center was created 22 years ago to offer a school for individuals with autism to learn through interventions proven through scientific research as most effective. This science is called Applied Behavior Analysis or, ABA. ABA, like all scientific fields is ever evolving and it is incumbent upon CLC staff to be up to date with advancements in our science to ensure our services are consistent with best practice.



Part of intervention for individuals with autism may involve helping to find appropriate, alternative responses to replace challenging, and sometimes dangerous, behavior. Research published by Dr. Greg Hanley, et al. offers improved strategies for intervention of challenging behavior called, Interview-Informed Synthesized Contingency Analysis (IISCA) and incorporates Practical Functional Assessment (PFA) and Skills-Based Training (SBT). CLC's Directors have been learning about the IISCA/PFA-SBT through conference presentations and completed an intensive 10-hour training this past summer.

By incorporating new knowledge learned from these trainings into existing intervention plans for our students/adult learners or by creating entirely new plans, benefits are already evident to some individuals served by CLC. These procedures involve teaching learners that, rather than engaging in challenging behavior, they can easily and effectively affect their environment, to get their needs met, through a simple communication response. While teaching functional communication responses as a replacement to undesired responses is certainly not new in the field of Applied Behavior Analysis, the nuanced procedures outlined through Dr. Hanley's work streamlines the process and proves very effective for some individuals.

As with any intervention for individuals with autism, the process must be individualized. There is no "one size fits all" and through our experience with implementing the PFA/SBT, this certainly holds true. We gain new information through each experience with our learners and refine our processes, as one would expect with a scientific approach. It is exciting to offer new strategies for our instructional staff to add their skillset and even more exciting to see some of our students and adult learners benefit from a more efficient way of learning new skills!



AJ Foundation Financial Overview







*AJF was able to provide an additional \$50,000 grant from its reserve funds to CLC in 2021-2022
